



New Knowledge:

- A port is a docking place for ships. They may load/unload cargo.
- Liverpool is one of the country's biggest ports.
- Building began on the docks in 1715.
- Liverpool became an internationally important port due to the increase in trade with Americas including sugar from the West Indies.
- During the 18th century, Liverpool was Britain's main slavery port.
- Liverpool's 4 main import trades were: cotton, timber, grain and sugar.
- These goods, along with many others, were imported and taken to factories all over the north of England.
- Goods were imported from all over the world: Australia, The Americas, Asia.
- In the 18th, 19th and early 20th century, the port provided thousands of jobs.
- Today, Liverpool's importance in import and export trading has declined, but it is still the country's biggest
 western port.



New Knowledge:

- Port Sunlight was founded in 1888 by William Lever
- The village was built to house the workers from the soap factory Lever Brothers
- Lever Brothers has since become Unilever
- Port Sunlight was built so that industrial workers had affordable, sanitary houses surrounded by green spaces
- As well as houses, the village contained shops and public buildings
- William Lever did this to make his workers' lives secure and comfortable this promoted loyalty
- Port Sunlight was a key influence in the Garden City Movement, which promoted green spaces in inner cities

New Knowledge:

- Salt-making in Northwich dates back over 2000 years, when the salt towns of Cheshire were first established by the Romans.
- The Romans exploited the brine pits because salt was a precious and expensive natural commodity, used to preserve food and trade.
- Originally, salt was extracted from the ground by a series of natural brine pits.
- The Lion Salt Works was a historic open-pan salt making site, in the village of Marston, close to Northwich.
- The Lion Salt Works impacted on the local community, economy and the environment.
- Much of the open-pan salt works in Northwich developed along the line of the Trent and Mersey Canal.
- The early Lion Salt Works relied on the canal network to transport salt along the canal to the Anderton Boat Lift and down the River Weaver.
